

Brexit: EEA nationals

This factsheet explains who is eligible to apply for help when homeless, social housing and benefits between 1 January and 30 June 2021.

EEA: Austria, Belgium, Bulgaria, Croatia, Cyprus, Czechia, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Ireland, Italy, Latvia, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Malta, Netherlands, Poland, Portugal, Romania, Slovakia, Slovenia, Spain, Sweden, plus Iceland, Norway, Liechtenstein and Switzerland.

If you're an EEA national or a family member of an EEA national, from 1 January 2021 you are eligible to apply for help with homelessness and housing if you have:

- settled status under the EU Settlement Scheme
- pre-settled status and a right to reside under EU law that makes you eligible
- temporary protection until 30 June 2021 and a right to reside under EU law that makes you eligible

Settled and pre-settled status

EEA nationals and their family members who wish to continue living in the UK after 30 June 2021 should apply to the [EU Settlement Scheme](#) before that date.

The Scheme grants status based on the length of residence in the UK either as an EEA national or a family member, including those with derivative or retained rights.

The Scheme grants two types of status:

- **settled status** – usually granted to those who have lived in the UK for 5 years
- **pre-settled status** – granted to those who have lived in the UK for less than 5 years

Settled status is a form of **indefinite leave to remain**. People with settled status are **eligible** for help when homeless, social housing and benefits. They don't have to exercise rights under EU law.

If you have pre-settled status, you will be able to apply for help with housing and benefits only if you also have a right to reside under EU law that gives you eligibility.

EU Settlement Scheme is UK immigration law. If you are finding it difficult to apply, you have been refused status or granted an incorrect one, you should seek advice from a [charity](#) funded by the government to help with applications under the Scheme or from a [certified immigration adviser](#).

Temporary protection until 30 June 2021

If you have not yet applied under the EU Settlement Scheme, you will have temporary protection and be eligible for housing and benefits until 30 June 2021 if:

- you had any right to reside in the UK under EU law on 31 December 2020

- when you apply for housing or benefits, you have a right to reside under EU law that would make you eligible, for example as a worker or a family member of an EEA worker (see below)

Rights under EU law that make you eligible

If you have pre-settled status or temporary protection and need help with housing or benefits, you need to have a right to reside under EU law that makes you eligible for help, for example:

- as a worker or self-employed person
- a permanent right to reside – usually acquired on proof of 5 years of exercising rights under EU law

You may continue to be eligible for help with housing and benefits if you have stopped working or being self-employed because you:

- are sick
- are in the late stages of pregnancy
- have started vocational training
- have lost your job

Family members

If you are a family member of an eligible EEA national, you are eligible.

You may also be eligible if you:

- have gone through divorce
- your EEA family member died or left the UK
- you are a primary carer of a child in education and the other parent is or was an EEA worker

Some family members, for example unmarried partners, need documents from the Home Office confirming their status. Others, for example children and spouses, don't need them.

Some family members may be able to rely on the pre-31 December 2020 rules until 2022.

The law is complicated, so seek specialist immigration advice if you're unsure what to do.
