Flowchart

This flowchart helps you to check if your home could be classed as a house inmultiple occupation (HMO).

If you home is an HMO, your landlord may have additional health and safety duties.


Is your home an HMO?

Landlords of houses in multiple occupation (HMOs) have more responsibilities when it comes to the safety of their tenants. Some have to get a licence from the council.

HMOs occupied by 5 people must be licensed. Those occupied by fewer people may still need a licence, depending on the local council's rules. If you live in an HMO that should be licensed but isn't, you may be able

to get some of your rent back. If you are an assured shorthold tenant, your landlord may not be able to evict you using a 'no grounds' notice. The council could also fine the landlord.

This flowchart applies only if you don't live with your landlord. If you live in a purpose-built block of self-contained flats, the flowchart refers only to your flat.
